Putnam County Composite Squadron Leads Charge to Protect Children Partners with Save the Children to Help Families Prepare for Disasters

CARMEL, New York – September 16, 2017 – Putnam County Composite Squadron is taking a stand for children in Putnam County, NY to help ensure that when the next disaster strikes, families will be ready and children will be safe.

During the Children’s Expo & Public Safety Day, held on September 16, 2017 at the Putnam County Bureau of Emergency Services in Carmel, NY, squadron members, in cooperation with Save the Children and the Community Resilience Coalition in Putnam County, set up an information booth and hosted a Get Ready Get Safe Prep Rally to help build community awareness and educate children and families about simple steps they can take to prepare for disasters.

“We know children are particularly vulnerable during disasters,” said Squadron Commander, Captain Elena MacDermant. “By teaching them about emergency preparedness, we can build their resiliency so they can feel safe and effectively cope with crises.”

Each day, 69 million children are in school or child care away from their parents. Yet less than half of American families have an emergency plan and may not know how to reunite during or following an emergency. These startling statistics reveal a huge gap in our nation’s ability to protect children during disasters. That’s why Putnam County Composite Squadron, the only Civil Air Patrol squadron in the country to take part in the program, has stepped up to make preparedness a priority.

Cadets spoke with children and parents about emergency preparedness throughout the day, handed out family disaster checklists, disaster supplies checklists and helped families complete the Preparedness Pledge. Cadets also handed out Save the Children backpacks containing familiar items that may contribute to a child’s comfort during a disaster, such as teddy bears, flashlights, notebooks and pens, tissues, coloring books and crayons.

MacDermant directed the *Get Ready Get Safe Prep Rally*, emphasizing the importance of recognizing risks, planning ahead and gathering appropriate supplies before a disaster. Practical discussions were paired with fun and engaging activities such as the *Do the Prep Step!* dance video and select the wise supplies challenge. The children seemed to have the most fun with this activity, choosing between necessary and unnecessary items they would place in their packs in the event of a disaster.

“The Prep Rally program makes disasters less scary by giving children the tools they need to prepare and be ready,” said MacDermant. “Through fun activities and discussions, it helps children feel less afraid and more empowered to take actions that can help protect themselves and their families.”

Civil Air Patrol, the longtime all-volunteer U.S. Air Force auxiliary, is the newest member of the Air Force’s Total Force.
